As we move into a new quarter, we want to take a moment to reflect on what we've achieved so far this year, and share some exciting plans.




### Highlights from the Last Quarter (Q1, 2025)



# Why It Matters for Our Community

The Nigerian Society of Victoria once again organises Passport Intervention Program, scheduled to take place from the 23rd to the 25th of May 2025 in Melbourne. This initiative, in collaboration with the Nigerian High Commission in Canberra, is one of the most important community support services of the year — and we want to ensure every Nigerian family in Victoria takes full advantage of it. We have also included Children's day celebration as a way of celebrating and recognising the young age group as part of our community. We also want to use the opportunity to emphasize that any of the support service we organise is not just a mere event but an opportunity to interact with ourselves and improve our socio-cultutral well-being as Nigerians.

## Why Is This Program So Important?

For many Nigerians in Victoria, securing or renewing a Nigerian passport typically requires travel to Canberra or even Nigeria. The **Passport Intervention Program** brings the service closer to you — saving time, reducing cost, and easing stress for families, students, and professionals alike. For people who will be obtaining their passports for the first time, it is a significant milestone in asserting their roots and origin. We are bringing all these closer to you.

Whether you're:

- Applying for a new passport,
- Renewing an expired one, or
- Getting a first passport for your children born in Australia,

this is your opportunity to do so without leaving the state.

#### **Expression of Interest: Don't Miss the Deadline!**

To ensure a smooth and efficient process, all interested individuals must submit their Expression of Interest (EOI) by the 15th of April 2025. The EOI helps us to prepare adequately and allows the High Commission to plan logistics based on the number of applicants.

**No walk-ins will be accepted,** so please act early. The EOI link has been shared on NSV platforms and here it is once again: https://forms.office.com/r/tAv515pnRr?origin=lprLink—don't delay!

## **NIN Is Now Mandatory**

One critical requirement for your passport application is the **National Identity Number (NIN)**. If you do not yet have your NIN, we strongly encourage you to begin the process **immediately**.

NIN registration can take time, and having it ready before May will prevent delays or disappointment.

# The History of Nigeria: A Short Story

Once upon a time, in the heart of West Africa, there was a land of diverse cultures, rich traditions, and ancient civilizations. This land was called Nigeria, a name that would one day unite over 200 million people, speaking more than 500 languages.

Long before the country we know as Nigeria came into being, various kingdoms and empires flourished. The Nok civilization, which began around 1000 BCE, created intricate terracotta sculptures and made iron tools that influenced many in the region. To the north, the powerful empires of Ghana, Mali, and Songhai controlled vast trade routes, exchanging gold, salt, and knowledge with traders from across the world.

In the southern part of the land, the Yoruba kingdoms, including Ife and Oyo, were known for their art, religion, and political organization. The Benin Empire, rich in culture and skilled craftsmanship, was famous for its bronze plaques and art. Leaders like Nnamdi Azikiwe, Obafemi Awolowo, and Ahmadu Bello worked tirelessly to bring about a free Nigeria. The quest for self-rule intensified after World War II, as Nigeria's educated elite pushed for change.

Finally, on October 1, 1960, Nigeria gained its independence from Britain. It was a moment of joy and hope, but also one of challenges. With so many different ethnic groups and religions, Nigeria struggled to find unity. Tensions led to conflicts, and in 1967, a civil war broke out. The war, known as the Biafran War, lasted for three years and caused immense loss of life, but ultimately Nigeria remained united.

Through years of military rule, coups, and struggles for democracy, Nigeria eventually transitioned to a civilian government in 1999. The country began a new chapter, embracing democracy and striving for development in a world that was rapidly changing.

Today, Nigeria stands as one of the most influential nations in Africa, rich in resources, culture, and potential. It is a country of contrasts, where modern cities like Lagos and Abuja stand side by side with rural communities. Nigeria's history, shaped by resilience, conflict, and hope, continues to inspire future generations as it seeks to fulfill its promise as the "Giant of Africa."

And so, Nigeria's story is still being written—a story of a nation that overcame challenges, celebrated its diversity, and dreamed of a brighter future for all its people.
